#### **Operational Challenges:**

- Managing operations despite limited contractor availability and capacity
- Building new capacity in harvesting operations
- Increased costs
- Planning and harvesting on a constrained land base – i.e. visual impacts, wildlife, community and domestic watersheds, geotechnical, big trees, old growth
- Some proposed development areas constrained by difficult access
- Balancing management priorities to meet changing community needs

#### **2020 PLANNING and DEVELOPMENT**

Focused on forest health management – planning and development of Douglas-fir bark beetle salvage areas in order to reduce impacts to the community forest timber supply and realize value

#### **FOREST OPERATIONS**



NACFOR partnered with BC Wildfire Service to carry out a prescribed burn in a NACFOR cutblock in the McDonald Creek area. Objectives of the burn are to increase plantable spots, reduce slash creep, reduce brush competition, and mitigate wildfire risk by reducing ground fuels.

## Wildfire Risk Reduction Program Summary Why do Wildfire Risk Reduction around Nakusp and Area K?

#### **The Provincial Government**

mandate to do wildfire risk reduction work has been accelerated since damaging interface fires in Kelowna and Williams Lake areas.

To **reduce** potential fire intensity and create a **defendable space** around Nakusp and the interface communities.

Collect data and examine historic fires around Nakusp, both human and lightening caused.

**THE GOAL** improve public safety reduce the risk of catastrophic loss of infrastructure

The proposed fuel treatment units around rural Nakusp identified in the Community Wildfire Protection Plan (2017) create a community-scale wildfire fuel break to protect values and infrastructure in the Wildland-Urban Interface and Village of Nakusp.

The following animation was produced by the RDCK Wildfire Risk Reduction Group, which is a pilot project that NACFOR will participate in over multiple years.

More **consciousness** of the natural environment, management strategies, and the ecological importance of natural disturbance regimes after many years of fire suppression.

More rural residents, increased use of interface areas, and recreation activities.

Towns are expanding outwards into interface areas.

# Wildfire Risk Reduction Program Summary Why NACFOR?

Wildfire risk reduction was identified **as one of three strategic directions for NACFOR.** 





#### **Local Land Management**

NACFOR is a **local land manager and stakeholder** with a Board of Directors made up of Nakusp and Area K residents.

Wildfire risk reduction fits with **NACFOR's Mission**, **Vision, and Values** to benefit the community.

NACFOR has the *ability and resources* to undertake the planning and implementation of wildfire risk reduction tasks *on behalf of the Village of Nakusp and RDCK.* 



#### Unit 8, Airport Road

An example of blowdown, ground and ladder fuels in treatment area.

Windthrow has caused significant damage in the stand, creating a high wildfire hazard to nearby infrastructure and homes.

Proposed treatment is to remove dead and damaged stems from the stand and to reduce overstory stems to approximately 350 stems per hectare.

All deciduous species and large healthy Douglas-fir, cedar and White pine will be retained.

Ground and ladder fuels will be utilized for pulp or chipped / burned on site.





# Wildfire Risk Reduction Program Summary

#### **Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP)**

Identifies the *Wildfire risks* within and surrounding a community

Describes the **impacts** of previous and potential **wildfires** in the area

Develops a **plan to reduce** wildfire risk within and surrounding communities

Proposes fuel treatment units to create a **community**scale wildfire fuel break

The **RDCK Area K and Nakusp CWPP** was prepared by NACFOR under contract with RDCK and was **approved June 2018**.
